For instance, Group discussion method, question answer method, quiz, home assignments, class seminars are regularly organised to supplement the text book information. Remedial classes are also taken for the benefit of the slow and backward learners.

#### 6.3.3 Examination and Evaluation

As per the University guidelines ,one sessional examination is held in each semester. Appearance in this examination is compulsory for all the students. Marks secured in this examination are added to the marks secured in the end semester examination. A student who fails to appear in the sessional examination is not allowed to appear in the end semester examination. In each paper of the programme, 20% weightage is given in the internal evaluation and 80% weightage is given in the external evaluation. The answer scripts of the internal examinations are evaluated by the faculty members of the college and the marks are sent to the university.

#### **6.3.4** Research and Development

The college authority makes efforts to create a research environment in the college. Accordingly, teachers are encouraged to pursue research in their area of interest. Teachers are granted study leave for pursuing research. They also keep contributing to different research journals. This year, 4(four) teachers of the college have been awarded Ph.D Degree by different Universities.

- To sensitize them about issues related to Gender, inclusion and brotherhood.

- To introduce them to the new ways of Agricultural Practices.

#### The Context:

Kharupetia College is situated in Bologarah village under ShyamabariMouza in Darrang district of Assam.. The villages around the College aresocio-economically very underdeveloped. Most of these villages lack the basic developmental aspects of life. Nadirmukh is a village adjacent to the western part of the College. The entire population of the village belong to minority community.

As a part of its extension activities, and in compliance with the suggestions made by NAAC Peer Team in the Year 2004, Kharupetia College decided to adoptNadirmukh village. Accordingly, the College took initiative for organising various Community Development Programmes for the progress of the village folk.

#### The Practice:

The College adopted the village Nadirmukh in the year 2010. But in view of the mega disaster faced by the college in the form of the devastating fire on 20<sup>th</sup> Nov,2010 the college could not devote much attention to the village as the entire college fraternity had to remain busy in recreating the fire ravaged infrastructure of the college. Since the year 2013 the College has organised various Community Development Programmes in the village. The Extension Education Cell of the College conducted a survey in the said village with a view to ascertaining the status of the socio- economic condition of the village. Moreover, free medical camp, cleanliness drive, awareness programmes etc. are occasionally organised in the said village. The NSS Wing of the College organised a plantation programme in the village on 5<sup>th</sup> June,2014. During the time of Natural disaster like flood the college had extended its helping hand by donating food items and other materials.

#### **Evidence of Success:**

The practice of adopting village has proved to be successful. The people of the adopted village have responded to our efforts in a positive way. The participation of the villagers in almost all the programmes arranged there has been encouraging. They have come to realise that the college is their own institution and that they will surely be benefitted by the extension programmes to be undertaken by the college in the village. There is a considerable awareness about health and hygiene among the masses. People have started living a hygienic life with proper sanitation, filtered drinking water facilities. They have also become conscious about the need of environment preservation and other important issues. It is hoped that the efforts of the college towards the growth and development of the village will yield more perceptible results in the days ahead.

#### **Problems encountered and Resources Required:**

However, the College has faced constraints in terms of resources and time as the faculty members involved have their share of works in the college also. Besides, the College has its limitations in taking up the various projects. Again the motivation level of those villagers is very low. The College with its limited resources cannot take up the projects all the time. Apart from the human resources, the College needs financial resources as well. The College can spend only limited resources in the extension

activities.
